4A. The City officially introduces our new Code Enforcement Officer, David Bisby. He is excited to be with Rochester and has already found success in enforcing ordinance compliance.

4B. Lauren Coleman of the Rochester Hills Library gives their report on resident use of the library as well as upcoming library upgrades since the new agreement with the City. The library is now open on Sundays year-round. They are seeing an increase in online/electronic materials popularity. There are plans to redesign the kids/preteen section through layout and programming associated with them. She is also happy to announce their new teen librarian program has been a great success in seeing more engagement and participation by the youth.

4C. Presentation by Signal Zero, LLC Film Company. Signal Zero is seeking communities to participate in their television show highlighting municipal parking. Two of the show's producers discuss the scope of what they would be seeking out of Rochester, what the outline of compensation for participation would look like, and what the timeline they are seeking would be. City Council asks questions regarding the scope and decision-making authority and is asking the City's Police Department to bring this back before Council with more information and what an example access agreement would look like.

One resident asks Council to increase signage at Mt. Avon Cemetery to restrict dog access and continue to keep pets out of the cemetery.

8. LEGISLATIVE DELIBERATIONS

8A. Consideration to approve the Elizabeth Park Resolution and to approve the grant agreement and appropriate matching funds in the amount of \$125,000.

Project Manager Warner outlines the project and what the City is needing to put forward to obtain the grant for the Elizabeth Park project.

Council asks about what community input went into the creation and design of the park and what is included in the initial phase. Council also gives a lot of credit for the grants received and would like that highlighted on the construction sign outside the project for construction.

8B. Consideration of Social District Ordinance – Second Reading and Adoption and MLCC Resolution regarding Social District.

Attorney Kragt gives the update regarding where Council stands with the progress of the Social District. There were comments and feedback given to Attorney Kragt last meeting regarding changes. Those comments were incorporated into the new language of the ordinance. Attorney

Kragt would like to change some language such as "beverages" or "drinks" into being clearer and using "alcoholic beverages." This is now Council's opportunity to have the second reading and adoption if it would like to move forward.

Chief Rouhib and Director Trevarrow give their update on the changes and the boundaries. There are now wristbands for those participating that will make enforcement easier. There is only one alcohol providing business that would like to participate in the Social District that is not within the boundaries but understood given their location. There were also changes to limit two drinks per purchaser. Chief Rouhib also talks about an additional liability insurance for the businesses that could add a layer of protection, this is not needed but believes this would be a good idea. Both Director Trevarrow and Chief Rouhib are pleased with this iteration of the plan and District.

Council asks clarifying questions regarding the Social District borders. Council also asks about the rules of bringing alcoholic beverages into other stores downtown. Council asks about the timetable after adoption and thanks staff for their work.

To approve the establishment of the Rochester Social District which includes the approval of the resolution, the map and plan, and moving for second reading and adoption.

There are going to be different rates for the different water systems, the well and GLWA water systems. As such, there are different rates. This increase is a part of the continuing increase in rates in a smooth manner to avoid a single year shock increase. The revenue forecasts and fund balance forecasts are discussed.

Director Schafer also discusses the upcoming project of the repainting of the water tower and what that bid timeline would look like.

Council asks administration about potential changes, if they've considered monthly payments instead of quarterly payments.

Issue: Consideration of an ordinance amendment to Sec 34-32 to remove requirement to have a permit for dogs and other pets to be in the City parks.

Analysis:

I have been asked to prepare an ordinance amendment to Sec 34-32 of the City Code to remove the requirement for someone to have a special permit to allow dogs and other pets to be in City parks. Currently, Sec 34-32(13) requires a special park permit before someone can bring in their dog or other pet into City parks, except for guide, leader, hearing and service dogs. Removing this requirement would not remove the other City’s code requirements for having dogs and other animals, such as the requirements in Sec 8-43 to maintain control over dogs and cats and picking up waste left by the animals.

Requested Action: For City Council to discuss the draft ordinance and decide whether it wants to move forward with the ordinance amendment. If so, the needed action would be to move the ordinance amendment for first reading and introduction.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 34, PARKS AND RECREATION, ARTICLE II, PARK RULES AND REGULATIONS, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER TO REVISE SEC. 34-32, PROHIBITED ACTS, TO REMOVE THE REQUIREMENT TO HAVE A PARK PERMIT FOR PETS IN CITY PARKS.

THE CITY OF ROCHESTER ORDAINS:

Section 1. Chapter 34, Parks and Recreation, of the Code of the City of Rochester shall be amended as follows:

Article II – Park Rules and Regulations

Sec. 34-32. Prohibited Acts.

No person shall:

- (1) Obstruct any roadway, lane or sidewalk in any public park or playground;
- (2) Injure, mar or damage in any manner any monument, ornament, fence, bridge, seat, tree, shrub, flower, playground equipment, fireplace, or other public property within or pertaining to any public park or playground;
- (3) Climb or otherwise engage in play on any structure or vegetation in any public park or playground not specifically designed and provided for such purpose;
- (4) Remove any structure, vegetation, dirt, sand, earth or sod located in any public park or playground;
- (5) Sit or lie upon walks, passages, bridges, parking lots, or greenbelt areas adjacent to parking lots or the Rochester Community House;
- (6) Congregate within a motorized vehicle parked, stopped or standing in a permissible parking area;
- (7) Use any loudspeaker, public address system or sound-amplifying equipment of any kind without proper written permission of the city manager; permission shall not be granted if such equipment is capable of interfering with the use or enjoyment of the park by others;
- (8) Operate any motor vehicle, radio, television, phonograph, tape recorder, or any other device in such a manner as to create noise that disturbs or annoys others;
- (9) Engage in any loud, abusive, boisterous or otherwise disorderly conduct tending to create a disturbance or annoy others;
- (10) Construct or maintain any item or structure within a park except on specific permit by the city;
- (11) Swim in a park, pond or creek;
- (12) Leave or drop off any birds, animals or fish in the municipal parks or its waterways.
- ~~(13) Allow any dog, pet and/or tame animals to walk, run or otherwise enter on or into any park area within the city, including Dinosaur Hill Nature Preserve, without a special permit for access to any park area issued by the city clerk. Said permit, restrictions, cost, dog owner~~

~~responsibilities and such other terms or conditions on said permit shall be established by resolution by the city council. This prohibition and need for permit shall not apply to any guide, leader, hearing or service dog.~~

Section 2. SEVERABILITY

If any section, subsection, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent portion of this Ordinance, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

Section 3. REPEAL

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Issue: Consideration of an ordinance amendment to Sec 14-10 to allow dogs and other pets in the Cemetery.

Analysis:

I have been asked to prepare an ordinance amendment to Sec 14-10 of the City Code to remove the prohibition against dogs and other pets from being in the Cemetery. Currently, Sec 14-10 prohibits bringing dogs or other pets into the Cemetery, except for guide, leader, hearing and service dogs.

When considering such an amendment, I felt that the best approach was to leave the general prohibition in the ordinance, but create a scenario where they would be permitted. The attached draft ordinance amendment prohibits dogs and other pets unless they are on a leash, not running at large, not causing damage or defecating or urinating on grave sites. I also inserted a requirement to remove all waste immediately.

Requested Action: For City Council to discuss the draft ordinance and decide whether it wants to move forward with the ordinance amendment. If so, the needed action would be to move the ordinance amendment for first reading and introduction.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 14, CEMETERY, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER TO REVISE SEC. 14-10, GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS REGARDING DOGS ON CEMETERY PROPERTY.

THE CITY OF ROCHESTER ORDAINS:

Section 1. Chapter 14, Cemetery, of the Code of the City of Rochester shall be amended as follows:

Sec. 14-10. General rules and regulations.

- (a) The cemetery shall be open to the public every day. The hours shall be from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. between October 31 and April 1. The remainder of the year the grounds will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.
- (b) In observance of the propriety of the cemetery, the following conduct is prohibited:
 - (1) Loud or boisterous talking.
 - (2) Idling or loafing on the grounds.
 - (3) Bringing or consuming of food or refreshments on the grounds.
 - (4) Peddling, soliciting, or the posting of advertisements or signs.
 - (5) Bringing of dogs or other pets into the cemetery, ~~with the exception of guide, leader, hearing and service dogs, unless said pet and is on a leash not exceeding six (6) feet in length. Pets shall not be allowed to run at-large, cause damage, or defecate or urinate on grave sites. Pets are not allowed in the cemetery during special events or during a burial service. All waste shall be immediately removed and properly disposed of.~~
 - (6) Littering of the grounds.
- (c) The speed of automobiles or other vehicles shall not exceed ten miles per hour while in the cemetery and shall be driven as quietly as possible. No horn or other signal shall be sounded unless for an emergency or to avoid an accident. Vehicles shall be confined to the roadway portions of the cemetery.

Section 2. SEVERABILITY

If any section, subsection, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent portion of this Ordinance, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

Section 3. REPEAL

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Proposed for City Council consideration | August 2026

PURPOSE: Advance the physical, mental, emotional, and social well-being of people who live, work, and gather in Rochester through practical initiatives, education, partnerships, and recommendations to City Council.

1. Role and Scope

The Committee serves as the City's coordinating body for City employee and community wellness. It connects people and resources and supports practical efforts that make healthy choices and meaningful connection easier.

The Committee will:

- Assess community wellness needs, assets, gaps, and partnerships.
- Recommend and help coordinate education, programs, pilots, and partnerships.
- Develop an annual work plan for City Council and provide an annual impact report to City Council.

Scope and boundaries:

- As needed by City Council, review proposed ordinances and resolutions and provide a health and wellness perspective or recommendations.
- The Committee does not provide clinical services, direct City departments, or independently commit City funds.
- Coordinate with existing organizations and City bodies, including Sustainability and City Beautiful, to complement rather than duplicate programs.

2. Focus Areas

1. **Healthy Food & Nutrition** - *Improve access to nutritious food and make healthy eating easier, more visible, and more affordable.*
2. **Active Living & Healthy Places** - *Shape everyday routines and places so walking, biking, recreation, and time outdoors are safe and convenient for all ages and abilities.*
3. **Mental Well-Being, Prevention & Safety** - *Improve awareness, reduce stigma, and strengthen access to prevention, early support, and community resources.*
4. **Connection, Belonging & Purpose** - *Reduce isolation and strengthen the relationships, participation, and sense of purpose that help communities thrive.*
5. **Health Access, Education & Workplace Wellness** - *Connect people with practical information, preventative services, and opportunities to improve well-being where they live and work.*

3. Guiding Approach

The Committee will draw from practical community well-being approaches, including selected Blue Zones themes, while tailoring priorities to Rochester's needs and values.

4. Membership and Meetings

- Five to seven members appointed in accordance with City procedures.
- Membership should reflect a mix of knowledge, professional roles, community backgrounds, and neighborhood engagement.
- The Committee will meet at least four times annually.

5. Measuring Community Wellness

The Committee will establish public-facing quantitative measures that provide a concise snapshot of community health and wellness, track progress over time, and help show whether Rochester's well-being is improving.

6. Phased Roadmap

- **2026 | Launch:** Secure City Council approval, appoint members, establish the Committee and its first work plan, and pursue an early opportunity to expand City employee wellness initiatives.
- **2027 | Build & Demonstrate:** Establish the Community Wellness Snapshot, select a small number of measurable priorities, and deliver visible community value through focused initiatives and partnerships.
- **2028+ | Sustain & Scale:** Use results and community input to strengthen successful efforts, expand effective partnerships, and maintain a focused, repeatable approach to community wellness.
