Re: Data Center proposal

I am unable to attend the meeting on May 19, 2026. I wish to make my concerns known to you. The information I reference comes from two articles: "From Energy Use to Air Quality, the Many Ways Data Centers Affect US Communities", World Resources Institute, 2/17/2026; and "What are the Pros and Cons of Data Centers?", TechRepublic Report, 2/5/2026.

I believe a Data Center is wrong for the Rochester Hills community.

My main concerns deal with the extraordinary use of power from the grid and water usage. Let's start with power. The estimates suggest power usage equivalent to 25,000 to 100,000 homes depending upon the size of the data center. To adequately supply the center the grid would need significant upgrades including the use of renewables. My concern relates to the strain on the existing grid and the associated costs. I do not wish to see my electric bill increase yet again. In the planning, if DTE creates a special billing structure for the data center and associated rate fees, I would have less objection.

My second concern is water usage. Depending upon size, data centers use between 110 million gallons a year to 5M gallons per day. This is an equivalent use of 1,000 houses in one year for the smaller center. Unless there sufficient ground rules regarding water use with an eye to the future are in place, this sounds like a raw deal for Rochester Hills. This community was in drought at the beginning of the year. We just went through a water main break that with good fortune and community support was shorter and less disruptive than projected.

Other areas to consider are noise pollution from the constant use of cooling fans (85 decibels), air pollution from the gas- and diesel-powered fans, and land use issues as these centers can occupy .35 sq miles of land that would see better use for housing or farming.

Last, the profits from these data centers are only fractionally returned to the community. Major companies, such as Google, earn much more than the communities that accept the data centers are offered in return. Even the number of long-term jobs created range from 25 to 150.

Once a data center is in will there be a push to enlarge the center? While not the same industry, take a look at the difficulties Evert, MI had with ICE Mountain once the company had a foothold in the community.

Please give significant thought to the quiet, forested, and park-filled community that is Rochester Hills before venturing into this enticing but problem-filled world of data centers.

I am writing to strongly oppose any data centers in Rochester Hills. Here is some information regarding data centers:

To avoid noise pollution from cooling systems and backup generators, it is recommended to live at least **1 to 2.5 miles** away from a data center. While data centers are generally safe and quiet, they can produce a constant, low-frequency hum audible up to 2 miles away, with significant impacts felt within 3000 feet.

Key Considerations for Proximity:

- Noise Impact:** Data centers can emit noise levels exceeding 90 decibels, often a low-frequency hum that travels long distances and can cause stress or sleep issues for nearby residents.
- Safety & Pollution:** While radiation is generally contained, some studies indicate communities within one mile of EPA-regulated data centers may experience higher air pollution (nitrogen dioxide and diesel particulate matter) from backup generators.
- Recommended Buffer Zone:** Organizations, such as the [Sierra Club](#), suggest that to minimize impacts, data centers should ideally be located at least 2.5 miles away from residential areas.

It is not practical to have a data center in a city the size of Rochester Hills regardless of how much money it brings to the city.

I am actually shocked that the city is even considering it.

Hello,

My Name is Jo Soko, I am a resident of Rochester, MI, and my day job is in Cybersecurity. When we talk about Data Centers that are used to power AI, we are often also talking about community affectedness.

From a Fortune article, “a [study](#) by the Houston Advanced Research Center estimated data centers would use 49 billion gallons in 2025 and as much as 399 billion gallons by 2030 [in Texas],” which heavily impacts surrounding communities (1). Communities throughout the country have experienced everything from sediment in their water (5), decrease in water pressure (1), doubled water bills/pricing (1), a lack of transparency from developers (1, 3), various types of pollution (2,3), and more.

Michiganders’ current economic situation does not need to be further exacerbated by higher water bills, with everything else being increasingly expensive. Another economic strain is the last thing the residents of Rochester Hills, and Rochester, need.

The current amount of data centers in Michigan are currently able to support our technological infrastructure, and will for years, as there are 75 total data centers in the state already, with 33 in the Detroit area (4). While Lake Huron, Rochester Hill’s water supply (6), can certainly hold billions of gallons, what will we do if it runs dry and runs residents into dry ground?

I am urging every person sitting before me to implement an extension to the moratorium of the building of new Data Centers in Rochester Hills and the surrounding area, because the unknown extent of their impact needs further investigation. Rochester Hills is “innovative by nature,” and we need to protect both. Thank you for your time.
